The coin is of Western, Dobunnic type, and may be a contemporary forgery of a regular Iron Age coin. The obverse depicts a degenerated stylised head facing right, whilst the reverse depicts a horse facing right. See British Museum Catalogue numbers 3003-3011 for similar (Hobbs 1996, Plate 96). Hobbs notes that this particular type may be later than the main silver Dobunnic group, based upon the style of the right facing horse, which he suggests may exhibit a Roman influence. The coin dates from the late first century BC to early first century AD, with a date in the first century AD perhaps most likely. Diameter 13.25 mm, thickness 2.19, weight 1.1 grams.

The coin is a Northern Gold stater of Cunobelin of the joint Catuvellauni/Trinovantes tribe, "Wild Series A", Hobbs numbers 187-1792. The coin dates to late in the reign of Cunobelin, towards the latter end of the first century BC to early first century AD. It exhibits some classical influence in the style of the horse and the execution of the coin ear. It bears the inscription CAMV for Camulodonum (Colchester) on the obverse and CVN for Cunobelin on the reverse. It measures 16.71 mm in diameter, 3.08 mm thick and weighs 5.4 grams.

The coin is irregularly shaped. It depicts a stylised boar facing right on the obverse, and a stylised horse facing right on the reverse. Compare ABC number 1800 (page 94) which corresponds to Van Arsdell numbers 875, 877-1 or BMC 3214-17. The coin is 17.16mm long, 13.87mm wide and 1.55mm thick. 1.28g.

BMC volume II, numbers 822-825AD 72. Mass: 10.4g. Diameter: 27.4mm.

The coin has a diameter of 17.3mm but is oval and is 1.5mm thick. It weighs 1.5g. The coin is badly corroded. For reference see Sear's "Roman Coins and their Values", Volume 3, page 391, numbers 11239 or 11240.

The coin has a diameter of 18.9mm and is 1mm thick. It weighs 1.4g. The obverse legend and reverse are in good condition, but the bust is weak. The coin is complete. For reference see North Volume II, numbers 1017 - 1021.

The coin is slightly clipped. It is 17.9mm in diameter and 0.5mm thick. It weighs 1.43gm. Reference: North, volume 2, numbers 1243-1246.

These coins usually have a greater silver content suggesting that this example may be a contemporary copy. Compare EMC references numbers 2005.0148 which is very similar, and also 1996.0101. Type 72 is less common than type 85 and 37.

The weight is square with a flat base. The obverse of the weight depicts the Middelburg coat of arms (a swimming lion) on a shield within a wreath. At the top of the shield is 8 X 7, the numbers representing the year 1587 and the X might possibly represent the denomination. To the left of the shield is M, the first initial of the maker's name. The reverse has a decorated impression which appears to represent a crowned seated figure facing holding a standard of sceptre. The surface is dark greenish-brown and has a fair amount of wear. This coin weight dates to 1587. See: Withers, p57 for a similar example.
